While the immediate above is written to make a point, God teaches us that His word is alive and still relevant to man. First, the Bible teaches that God is eternal. Several passages speak of an "eternal God" (see Deut. 33.27; Rom. 16.26) or "eternal Spirit" (Heb. 9.14). This would explain why "In the beginning, [that is, when time began for us] God created the heavens and the earth" (Gen. 1.1). He has always been and will always be. As He told Moses, "I AM who I AM" (Exo. 3.14). Therefore God affirms that He has always existed. Likewise, an eternal being is of necessity a living being. Numerous passages show that our Father is in fact a living God (Psalm 84.2; Heb. 10.31, etc.). Next, we learn that God does not change. He said, "For I the Lord do not change..." (Mal. 3.6). James taught, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (James 1.17) and finally, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13.8). Since He is eternal, living and does not change, He can be acknowledged as, "I AM who I AM."

Since our Creator is all these things and more, this proves His word is eternal, living and does not change! The Bible affirms that God's word "stands forever" to "all generations" (Psalm 33.10-12), is "settled in heaven" (Psalm 119.89), "endures forever" (Psalm 119.160), and is to be kept (Psalm 12.6-7). As God said, "...so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it" (Isaiah 55.11).

No wonder inspired men wrote, "For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart" (Heb. 4.12) and "...you have been born again, not of perishable seed but of imperishable, through the living and abiding word of God..." (1 Peter 1.23). Peter affirms that the word of the Lord is living and imperishable. Since the word of God is likened to a seed (Luke 8.11), wherever that seed is planted, the word is living in that soul. Thus no matter if the Bible is 2,000 years old or a million years old, God and His word are living, imperishable, and unchanged. Don't be fooled by Satan's attempt to undermine the Bible. BG
